Text. Linear Algebra Done Wrong by Sergei Treil.

*Syllabus*. We will cover the first five chapters of the text, and cover selected topics to be determined from chapters 6 and 7 as time permits. See the table of contents of the text for the topics involved.

*Grades*. There will be two midterm exams and a final:

Exam 2. Thursday 04/17/2008

Final Exam. Tuesday 05/13/2008 at 2:00 PM.

The final exam is 3 hours long, and its date and time are chosen by the registrar. You must be available on that date at that time to take the final.

Homework will be assigned approximately every week. I will assign a number of problems each time, and will grade two of them (you will not know the choice ahead of time). I will drop your two lowest homework grades. Late homework will not be accepted under *any* circumstances (which is why I drop the two lowest homework grades).

Exam 1, 20%

Exam 2, 20%

Final Exam. 40%
