1. Are the following expressions functions? If they are not, explain why and how would you fix the domain or range to make it a function.

(a) (1 point)

$$f : \mathbb{R} \rightarrow [0, 1] \quad (1)$$

$$x \rightarrow f(x) = x^2 \quad (2)$$

(b) (1 point)

$$f : \mathbb{R} \rightarrow \mathbb{R} \quad (3)$$

$$x \rightarrow f(x) = 1/x^2 \quad (4)$$

(c) (1 point)

$$f : \mathbb{R} \rightarrow \mathbb{R} \quad (5)$$

$$x \rightarrow f(x) = 1/(x^2 - 1) \quad (6)$$

(d) (1 point)

$$f : \mathbb{R} \rightarrow \mathbb{R} \quad (7)$$

$$x \rightarrow f(x) = x^2 + 3x \quad (8)$$

2. Plot the following functions:

(a) (2 points)

$$f : \mathbb{R} \rightarrow \mathbb{R} \tag{9}$$

$$x \rightarrow f(x) = x^2 \tag{10}$$

(b) (2 points)

$$f : \mathbb{R} \rightarrow \mathbb{R} \tag{11}$$

$$x \rightarrow f(x) = 2x^2 + 1 \tag{12}$$

(c) (2 points)

$$f : \mathbb{R} \rightarrow \mathbb{R} \tag{13}$$

$$x \rightarrow f(x) = 2x^2 + 4x + 3 \tag{14}$$

Tip: You may want to use the identity $(x + 1)^2 = x^2 + 2x + 1$, and use the graph you plotted above.
